Directives

CVID-19 CORONAVIRUS

Ontario

As of February 24, there are a total of 296,173 confirmed cases, 279,230 resolved cases, 6,893 deaths, and 675 hospitalizations (with 287 in ICU) due to COVID-19 in Ontario reported (21,807 deaths in Canada so far)

Compared to the previous day, this represents:

An increase of 1,054 confirmed cases An increase of 9 deaths An increase of 1,291 resolved cases

The cumulative case count associated with long term care home residents is 14,927 with 3,860 deaths; the change in cases since Feb. 22 is only 2 (and 1 death)

Confirmed variants of current concern in Ontario include

Lineage B.1.1.7 (U.K. variant) – 395 cases Lineage B.1.351 (South African variant) – 9 cases

Timiskaming Health Unit


- -Since the pandemic began, there have been a total of 92 confirmed cases and there are **currently NO active infections of COVID-19 in the Timiskaming District** after the last positive case was deemed resolved Tuesday afternoon.
- -Cumulative rate per 100,000 population in the region is 278 per 100,000 people
- -Since the beginning of December, the number of COVID-19 cases in the health unit's coverage area has more than quadrupled, rising from 19 to 92. There have been 61 new cases since Christmas Eve, accounting for 66 per cent of the total infections since the pandemic began, all of which have been resolved.
- -Note for all of North Eastern Ontario, there are currently 85 total active cases (28 in Public Health Sudbury District, 28 in North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit, 3 in Algoma Public Health/Sault Ste Marie area, 26 in Porcupine Health Unit/Timmins area and no cases in Timiskaming Health Unit).


Québec

- -In the past 24 hours, there have been 806 new cases, bringing the total number of people infected in the province to 284,472 since the start of the pandemic (266,138 have recovered)
- -The data also reports 5 new deaths in the last 24 hours, for a total of 10,346
- -The number of hospitalizations decreased by 25 compared to the previous day, for a cumulative total of 655. Among these, the number of people in intensive care increased by 10 for a total of 130
- -8,807 doses of vaccine were administered yesterday, for a total of 376,910 to date and 509,325 doses have been received so far.

Abitibi-Témiscamingue

- There have been a few hospital transfers in the last few days associated with the COVID-19 hospital in Rouyn-Noranda but all COVID-19 cases remain there for this region
- Presently 40 active cases (5 cases presently hospitalized in Rouyn-Noranda with 1 In ICU)
- The outbreak at the local school has ended and all students are back in class
- All 8 cases associated with the daycare have been contained with adequate contact tracing
- After the Christmas break, there were two variant strains identified (these variant show similar symptoms but seem to be more contagious); thus, important to maintain public health control measures
- For the 2nd dose, CISSSAT will ensure they do not exceed the 90-day time span and there will be a verification notice in 2weeks before the clinic
- All vaccines given at the recent clinic are recorded in the provincial vaccine registry and people can shortly, in a few
 weeks, be able to go onto the Clic Santé Quebec website, start an account and download the vaccination information if needed

Moderna Vaccine Second Dose

A second round of vaccinations will be coming into the community wthin 90 days of the last dose. Nursing staff will be contacting those who have already gotten their vaccine to assess any changes of health and to arrange for an appointment.

Members living within the community who missed the first round of vaccinations will be able to also get their first vaccination, however quantities will be limited and cases will be assigned according to health priorities. More information coming in next update.

Once all the vaccinations are rolled out and all the paperwork has been sent to the health ministry, members will be able to access their vaccination record online via ClicSÉQur.

FNQLHSSC Update highlights

Quebec:

- Outaouais region to go from red to orange
- Easing of measures including in red zones during March Break
 - cinema openings, indoor and outdoor activities but gatherings still limited and curfews maintained (8pm red zones; 9:30pm orange zones). Police will monitor cabins and tourist places
- Quebec utilizing rapid testing to reduce outbreaks
