



# CVID-19 CORONAVIRUS

### Ontario

As of November 10, there are a total of 88,209 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Ontario reported to date.

Compared to the previous day, this represents:

An increase of 1,426 confirmed cases (percent change of +2.7%)


An increase of 15 deaths (percent change of 0.0%)

An increase of 886 resolved cases (percent change of +13.4%)

3,275 confirmed deaths in Ontario

### **Timiskaming Health Unit**

Change in cases since November 2nd: 0
Cumulative case count since the beginning of the pandemic: 17
Cumulative rate per 100,000 population: 52.0 per 100,000 people
Note for all of North Eastern Ontario, there are currently 80 active cases (60 active cases in Sudbury)




### Quebec

- -Administration region of Estrie in the Eastern Townships is being designated a red zone, all of Gaspe will be orange
- -In the past 24 hours there have been 1,378 new cases, bringing the total number of people infected to 118,529 in the province
- -The data also report 22 new deaths, for a total of 6,515.
- -The number of hospitalizations increased by 39 compared to the previous day, for a cumulative total of 573. Among these, the number of people in intensive care increased by 2, for a total of 84.

### Abitibi-Témiscamingue

- -Number of confirmed cases since the beginning of the pandemic: 254
- -Confirmed cases in the region from Nov.1 to Nov. 7 is 4
- -Confirmed deaths in this region since the beginning of the pandemic: 4
- -Total confirmed cases since the start of the pandemic: 254

### **ELIGIBILITY FOR SUMMER JOBS**

This does not apply to a student with a spare as they are still enrolled in school.

### **INCENTIVE AWARDS - RDQ**

Please be aware that RDQ will have only 2 report cards this year. The incentive awards that the TFN Education Department offers for honor roll (80%+ average) will now be divided into 2 terms instead of 3 as was done in the past. The total prize money is the same, just distributed differently. Therefore, a prize of \$80 will be offered to students who qualify at the end of January and then in June.



### Kiwetin Kikinamading – IMPORTANT UPDATE!

We would like to announce that effective Monday, November 23, all Grade 6, 7 and 8 students will once again <u>attend school daily</u>. With the use of Google classroom and additional staff at the school, we will be able to accommodate all of our students, even if teachers become ill (and have to work from home while awaiting Covid testing/results).

The safety of our students has been our number one concern, along with the continuation of their education. We know this hasn't been an easy situation for many, but we sincerely appreciate the creativity and patience that we have seen throughout these past few weeks.

### **TIMISKAMING FIRST NATION SNOW REMOVAL**

The TFN Public Works Department is pleased to offer our on-reserve senior members of the community a snow removal service, free of charge to their main residence. This service is also be offered to TFN handicapped members at a reduced rate. Furthermore, the service will be provided to all community service buildings.

Please remember that this is a service we are providing, it is not an obligation on our part, TFN will not be held responsible in any way for accidents or injuries resulting from lack of sand or slippery yards or any damage to properties. The service of snow removal only applies to driveways; Drive-ways will be plowed to allow adequate access to the residence. Additional snow removal (ex. Clearing of large driveways) will be at the home owners' expense.

In order to have a fair system, the criteria are and will be followed as such: To qualify for this service, you must:

### Senior

Person must be a TFN band member and make request. (As of November 30<sup>th</sup>)

Must be the main home owner and reside there.

Sign an annual agreement with the TFN administration.

Be 65 years of age or over. (By December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year)

### Disabled/Handicapped

A certificate from your doctor. (Stating reason and duration of disability that would prevent physical activity) Have no other person physically capable of clearing snow residing with them.

The service will be offered at a discount rate of \$90.00. (Winter season)

Sanding of cleaned driveway will be added for additional \$20.00.

### WINTER TIRES: MANDATORY FROM DECEMBER 1 TO MARCH 15 INCLUSIVE

From December 1 to March 15 inclusive, all motorized road vehicles registered in Québec (other than heavy vehicles, tool vehicles and farm machinery) must be equipped with winter tires.

This requirement also applies to rental passenger vehicles in Québec, as well as mopeds, motorized scooters and motorcycles.

IF YOUR VEHICLE IS NOT EQUIPPED WITH WINTER TIRES BETWEEN DECEMBER 1 AND MARCH 15 INCLUSIVE:

The fine varies from \$200 to \$300, plus costs.

From December 1st to March 15 inclusively, all taxis and passenger vehicles registered in Québec must be equipped with winter tires. This requirement also applies to rental passenger vehicles in Québec.

For more information on this regulation, refer to the Web site of the Ministère des Transports.



Since December 15, 2014, only tires on which this pictogram is engraved or studded tires are considered winter tires for the purposes of the Highway Safety Code.

STUDDED TIRES AND CHAINS: AUTHORIZED BETWEEN OCTOBER 15 AND MAY 1 INCLUSIVE

Studded tires are authorized for: passenger vehicles any type of taxi any commercial vehicle not over 3,000 kg

### **Cold Weather Pet Care**

The frigid temperatures that coincide with Quebec winters can be dangerous for your pet. If you own or are caring for companion animals, you need to take extra precautions to protect them from the extreme cold. The best place for your pet is inside, except when you take it outside for exercise. Even long-haired dogs that are accustomed to being outside need extra precautions when the temperature plummets.

Crime Stoppers activities result in criminal arrests, seizure of stolen goods and narcotics, faster progress of certain police investigations, and raised community awareness of crime prevention.

Crime Stoppers administers and supports a network of affiliated regional groups in Quebec to help promote the organization, funding and raised awareness for regional residents. The program is managed by volunteers and based on cooperation between police, the media and the community, to prevent and stop crime. Crime Stoppers is funded by government grants, community fundraising activities, and direct fundraising.

### Why to create a toy library

The toy library is being created to encourage healthy child development. Play is important in stimulating the mental, emotional and physical development of children.

By playing with toys, children interact with objects and people, apply creative thinking, develop confidence, solve problems, and build physical skills.

The toy library will allow parents to help in their children development with a free and easy way to find educational toys. Your children could benefit and play with new toys without having to buy each toy for your home.

### Who will benefit from the services? Will there be a charge for the rental of toys?



### When will the toy library be open?

Due to the context of Covid, we had to postpone the opening but we hope to have the official opening no later than spring of 2021. We are currently working on the logistics aspect of the project which includes implementing a whole new process similar to a regular library system. We need to number each toy and give each family a member number. We also need to make a catalog of the toys and put the inventory online to allow access in an online process as well as in person once the pandemic is over.



**DID YOU Know?** Please note that First Nations communities have the option of adopting regulations that limit or prohibit the sale, distribution and consumption of cannabis on their territory.

Check with your band council to find out what by-laws are in effect.

As you may know, in our community of T.F.N, a resolution was done with voting (yes) or (no) to have a dispensary here in our community. Final decision was no. NNADAP

New information regarding the legalization of cannabis



Since its legalization in October 2018, cannabis has been governed by the Cannabis Act across Canada, to which are added specific restrictions issued by the provinces to regulate the non-medical use of cannabis.

Here are the main changes to the regulations in force in Quebec since November 1, 2019:

### Restriction on use in Public places

The consumption of cannabis in indoor and outdoor public places is now prohibited. These restrictions also apply to medical cannabis.

### Raising the legal age

It is now forbidden for people under the age of 21 to consume, possess or purchase cannabis, as well as access the points of sale of the Société Quebecoise du cannabis (SQDC). It is also prohibited to sell cannabis to anyone under the age of 21.



Following a conversation with Constable Fillion of TFN police, he informed me that it is prohibited to consume in and around public places. As legal age in Québec is 21, anyone caught violating this law under age may be fined and cannabis confiscated. Selling it is a criminal offence you will be fined and cannabis confiscated.
