### FNQLHSSC Udpate highlights

- -Second loans available under Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)
- -249,000 doses of Pfizer vaccine slotted for Dec. delivery for Canada's first shipment this month
- -Quebec ready to start it's vaccination plan after HC approval
- the first doses will go to long term care homes in Montreal and Quebec City
- -There will be 20 vaccination sites set up in the province to vaccinate up to 28,000 people by Jan. 4. Quebec is then expected to recireve 1.3 million doses of Pfizer and Moderna vaccine in the first 3 months of the year (2 doses each = 650,000 people)
- -Ministerial order to authorize more professionals to administer vaccine



COVID-19 preventative measures for the upcoming holidays

Holidays are just around the corner and as the number of COVID cases continues to climb, Chief and Council would like to encourage community members to consider the following directives:

# **Travel**

- -Please avoid large crowd gatherings during the holidays
- -Avoid going to hot spots (red zones)
- -Continue to follow public health measures including washing your hands and physical distancing
- -Wear a mask as much as possible especially when not in your bubble or when your space is compromised
- -Stay home and self isolate if you are experiencing symptoms.

# **Holiday Gatherings**

We are aware that limiting gatherings to 10 is close to impossible in some of our larger families. In order to keep safe and respect all the families in our community, we kindly ask that community members stick to their own household/family bubble during the holidays.

Although we do not encourage any outside visitors, those who are coming to visit from any other region are asked to stay within one household and limit any contact outside of their family bubble.

# **INFORMATION**

### Ontario

As of December 8, there are a total of 132,800 confirmed cases and 3,861 deaths (167 in the last week) due to COVID-19 in Ontario reported (12,983 deaths in Canada so far with 683 in the last week)

- Compared to the previous day, this represents:
- An increase of 1,890 confirmed cases (percent change of +13%)
- An increase of 28 deaths (percent change of +180%)
- An increase of 1,924 resolved cases (percent change of +24%)

## **Timiskaming Health Unit**

Currently 5 active case in Timiskaming region

- •Change in cases since November 23 is 5
- •Cumulative case count since the beginning of the pandemic is now 24
- •Cumulative rate per 100,000 population 67 per 100,000 people
- •Note for all of North Eastern Ontario, there are currently 32 total active cases (9 in Public Health Sudbury District, 9 in North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit, 1 in Algoma Public Health/Sault Ste Marie area, 8 in Porcupine Health Unit/Timmins area and 5 in Timiskaming Health Unit). Northeastern Ontario continues to experience some of the lowest COVID-19 incidence rates in the world even when population is factored into the measurements.
- Most of northeastern Ontario is currently in a green zone. Sudbury is in the yellow zone.
- A total of 12 people have died from COVID-19 in northeastern Ontario

# Québec

Current régions in the red zone include : Bas-Saint-Laurent, Capitale-Nationale, Chaudiere-Appalaches, Estrie, Lanaudiere, Laurentides, Laval, Maurice et Centre-du-Quebec, Monteregie, Montreal, Outaouais, Saguenay-Lac Saint Jean and Chapais & Chibougamau in North Ouebec

- In the past 24 hours, there have been 1,728 new cases, bringing the total number of people infected in the province to 156,468 since the start of the pandemic
- The data also reports 37 new deaths in the last 24 hours, for a total of 7,349
- The number of hospitalizations increased by 9 compared to the previous day, for a cumulative total of 844. Among these, the number of people in intensive care increased by 7 for a total of 121.

### Abitibi-Témiscamingue

- Number of confirmed cases since the beginning of the pandemic 293
- Total cases for the week of November 29 to December 5 is 20
- Confirmed deaths in this region since the beginning of the pandemic is 4
- -Three of the new 20 cases reported since December 3rd have been in the last 24 hours.
- The majority is linked to a private social event with 11 of the 14 cases reported over the weekend participants at this event were all relatives.
- -92 of the 118 cases since the start of the 2nd wave, have recovered, leaving 26 active cases with 21 of the active cases being in the RMC of Vallée-de l'Or.
- -Although 2 of the active cases are of school age. A mobile screening was deployed to the school but so far, there is no evidence of transmission within the school.
- Public health continues to monitor the situation and will keep you informed.





# IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR TDSS STUDENTS

COVID-19 Preventative Measures
JANUARY 4 TO 8, 2021

It is VERY important for our students to attend school <u>every</u> day this week, December 14 to 18, so that they are prepared for <u>online learning</u> the week of January 4 to 8. Even though you will not be at school that week, you MUST participate online in order to not fall behind in your course.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> course rotation ends on Tuesday, December 15. The bus will be bringing students home at noon on that day. The 4<sup>th</sup> course rotation begins Wednesday, December 16; students will get to meet their teachers, learn about the expectations for their course, and participate in online learning simulations with the iPads, so that they can fully participate from home during the week of January 4 to 8. Students will also be allowed to bring their iPads home each day this week, in case of bus cancellations due to inclement weather, so that they are able to access their classes online if necessary and are ready for online learning after the Christmas break.

### COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT GRADUATION REQUIREMENT

For the <u>2020-21 school year</u>, the ministry is revising the 40-hour community involvement graduation requirement so that students will not be adversely impacted by the ongoing challenges related to COVID-19. For students <u>graduating in the 2020-21 school year</u>, the community involvement graduation requirement will be reduced to a **minimum of** 20 hours of community involvement activities.

Students may wish to consider virtual volunteering, such as connecting with seniors, organizing virtual fundraising events and facilitating discussions with newcomer youth. Outdoor volunteer opportunities could include, for example, picking up litter.

In addition, the ministry is providing increased flexibility in how <u>all secondary students can earn hours</u> <u>in 2020-21</u>, as follows:

- 1. At the <u>principal's discretion</u>, schools may waive the restrictions that do not allow students to earn hours during the time allotted for the instructional program on a school day, or duties normally performed in the home (e.g., walking a younger child to and from school, helping younger siblings with school work).
- 2. Students aged 14 years and older can count up to a maximum of 10 hours from paid employment towards their earned hours at the discretion of the principal. Students counting paid employment towards their graduation requirement will be required to complete a reflection exercise indicating how their work contributed to the service for others. Students must also get these opportunities pre-approved by administration and signed off by their employers.

### TIMISKAMING FIRST NATION SNOW REMOVAL

The TFN Public Works Department is pleased to offer our on-reserve senior members of the community a snow removal service, free of charge to their main residence. This service is also be offered to TFN handicapped members at a reduced rate. Furthermore, the service will be provided to all community service buildings.

Please remember that this is a service we are providing, it is not an obligation on our part, TFN will not be held responsible in any way for accidents or injuries resulting from lack of sand or slippery yards or any damage to properties. The service of snow removal only applies to driveways; Drive-ways will be plowed to allow adequate access to the residence. Additional snow removal (ex. Clearing of large driveways) will be at the home owners' expense.

In order to have a fair system, the criteria are and will be followed as such: To qualify for this service, you must:

### Senior

Person must be a TFN band member and make request. (As of November 30<sup>th</sup>)

Must be the main home owner and reside there.

Sign an annual agreement with the TFN administration.

Be 65 years of age or over. (By December 31st of the current year)

### Disabled/Handicapped

A certificate from your doctor. (Stating reason and duration of disability that would prevent physical activity) Have no other person physically capable of clearing snow residing with them.

The service will be offered at a discount rate of \$90.00. (Winter season)

### Optional

Sanding of cleaned driveway will be added for additional \$20.00.

# REMEMBER DON'T LET A FRIEND DRINK AND DRIVE!



NEW YEARS AND FIREARMS..... NOT SAFE!!!!

The Timiskaming Police Force would like to give the public the following message concerning celebratory gun firing on New Years.

When fired into the air, bullets can return to the ground at speeds greater than 200 ft./sec., a sufficient force to penetrate the human skull and cause serious injury or death.

What goes up — the old saying — must come down, So that round in the air will come down somewhere, and if something bad happens, the person can be held responsible for their actions..just firing a gun can result in charges of careless use of a firearm or discharging it too close to people or places.

It's just not necessary to take a firearm out and shoot it up into the sky for no reason

This practice is not a First Nation tradition, firearms are a European invention, there are surely better ways to ring in the new year than with a loaded gun in your hand.



The TFN police have found a small trap suitable for muskrats, marten, and weasels. Call in with a description and we can return it to the owner.

### MESSAGE FROM THE HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES DIRECTOR

For some reason, we seem to be at an advantage here in the Abitibi-Temiscamingue and Northeastern Ontario bubble...so far. Whether it's because of our low population density or the dearth of crowded public transport, crowded apartments, elevators and institutions or just how cautious we have been with wearing masks, keeping our distance and availing ourselves of sanitizer, we seem to have kept the virus in check.

In the upcoming weeks, visitors may be arriving here. Without demonizing outsiders, we can follow the guidelines for self-isolation and social gathering restrictions and, with the advent of our rapid testing system hopefully by the new year, we can also screen people that travel from high risk areas. Mitigating the spread of the virus can be done with cooperation and kindness as we attempt to protect our seniors and vulnerable community members without adding to the stress and anxiety of these times. A unified response with an engaged population, as we work together to protect the elderly population is all about being diligent, careful and community-minded.

The recent AFNQL Assessment Report for the first wave of the pandemic reported that with only 35 cases and 2 deaths between March 13 and July 31, 2020 Quebec had the lowest number of COVID-19 cases in Indigenous communities in the country and a total absence of the virus in their long-term care homes for seniors. This is perhaps due to the fact that many community leaders like our Chief and Council, implemented their own measures quickly with an effective transition to remote work. At our Pandemic Committee updates, we continue to monitor Quebec measures while reframing it with our own planning and directives from Chief and Council.

Meanwhile, this same report also highlighted how young people have been directly impacted by public health measures that have been put in place, from interrupted studies to job losses to suspension of professional support services and these conditions add to various obstacles to education and employment that many First Nations youth must already contend with. Here at the Health and Wellness Centre, we hope to explore that issue further with outreach and activities here and our research and partnerships in an upcoming project with the psychology department at McGill University, Cultural knowledge keepers and staff.

Also, the report noted there has been an increase in psychological distress among women in communities especially those with lockdown measures; it has been difficult for many women to take time for themselves. Here in this community we have not experienced the current housing crisis as much as others which makes First Nations particularly vulnerable during a pandemic due to the lack of infrastructure, overcrowding and few options for isolating people who are sick or awaiting test results.

There is an ease here knowing that we have been doing well at containing COVID-19 and I hope this comfort extends itself to your holiday enjoyment. Nonetheless, we are not free of concern; we all have a sense of anxiety as we look south and west at the rising case numbers and hospitalizations. There is still risk and therefore, we go forward with masking, avoiding large gatherings and our temperature checks here at the workplaces and the manageable contact tracing being done by Quebec and Ontario public health to diligently stop any spread from the travel-related cases that are uncovered.

Therefore, let's turn COVID-19 fear into COVID-19 precautions as we all help each other feel safe and comfortable this holiday season. Let's not be careless travellers. Let's all do our part to help reduce the anxiety that might weigh on us during the holidays. It's important to recognize that these are traumatic times. We will continue to work together as we thoroughly try to test and direct self-monitoring and social restrictions amongst everyone who visits the community. Our COVID-19 anxiety is lessened when our response is driven by health data and not fear.

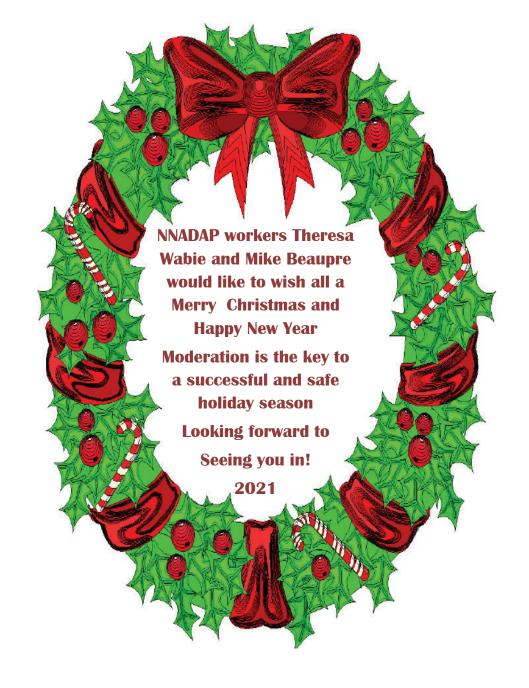

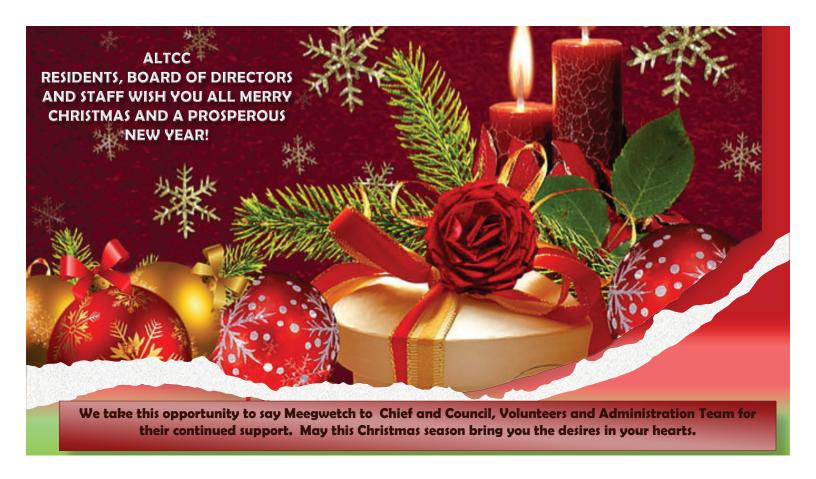

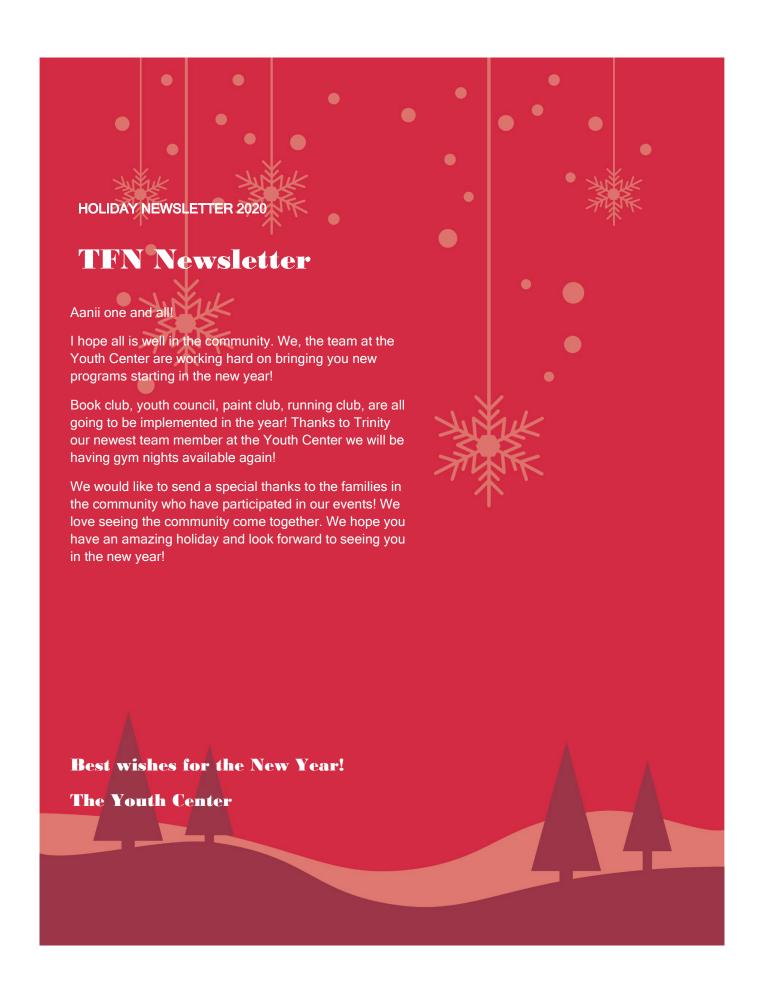

- primary consideration for the priority placement of an Indigenous child with the family and community, the last resort being the child placement outside the community
- consistency for placement of the youth within the child's community
- notice to be given to the child's parent, caregiver and community
- reasonable effort by the youth protection service provider to have the child continue to reside with the family and community with ongoing reassessments

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT**: Timiskaming First Nation endorses, in the event of youth protection services involvement deems necessary to remove children from parent's care, the practice of customary care agreements, whenever possible.
